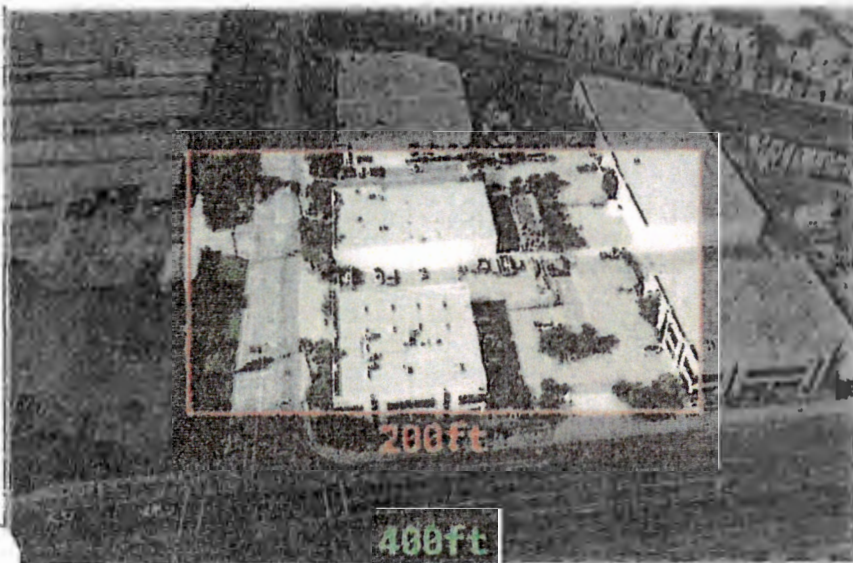

Good Morning,

I have used the help of FLOCK cameras to locate individuals wanted for sexual crimes against children.

One of my cases involved an individual that had moved to a different county in Texas. He was living in an RV park in Denton County that just so happened to have license plate readers at the entrance of the park. When the warrant was active and the notification hit was associated with the license plate on the vehicle he drove, the Law Enforcement Agency that had jurisdiction of that area was able to see when the suspect was at the location and made a swift and safe apprehension of the suspect for his felony warrant.

Another time FLOCK proved beneficial was for another case where the suspect continued to make contact with the juvenile victim. He actually drove to Kaufman County where the victim resides to pick her up when she ran away from home when she would call on him to get her. This victim has documented history of being a danger to herself and others. When the warrant went active, I checked FLOCK to see if I could possibly locate the suspect while he was at work as myself and other deputies were actively looking for him. FLOCK was beneficial as it revealed that the suspect had actually gone and driven by the victim's residence in the evening hours on the day he no called/no show for his interview with me. I immediately alerted the LE Agency for that area who understood the urgency and advised their officers to be on the look out. The suspect was located the following morning after the warrant went active and was apprehended safely without incident.

I've used the help of license plate readers on other cases involving individuals wanted for sexual crimes against children and was able to see that before his apprehension, the suspect was on the move locally and interstate. This helped to know when the suspect had gone beyond the boundaries of Hunt County, even the state of Texas, possibly with the victim, and when he returned. He was eventually apprehended and pled guilty to the offense.

FLOCK cameras have been a very useful tool in helping with the quick apprehension of child predators.

I just spoke with Det. Logsden with the Auto Theft Task Force at Paris PD. He told me of some recent successes they've had with the help of Flock...

1/27/25 had a stolen vehicle, a Mercury Cougar, put on a Custom HL at Paris PD. It was gone all week, but then hit again in Lamar Co. on one of their cameras, and they were able to recover it.

1/30/25

There was a hit and run suspect they'd been looking for, put it into the Custom HL, shared with other agencies, Reno PD was able to get it stopped and recovered.

2/5/25

'ad a Hyundai Sonata stolen out of Wise Co., had a Flock hit on a Paris PD camera, they recovered it, arrested for driving with unauthorized use of vehicle, possession of identifying info (the suspect had a bunch of other people's credit cards) and possession of a dangerous drug.

Det. Logsden said these were some that came to mind from the last couple of weeks. He also covers Hunt Co. for auto theft and said you can call him at 430-228-2741 if you need any other information.

## **North TX Success Stories and Stats**

In area of Hunt Co.:

### **Kaufman County Constable Pct. 2**

Windmill Farms MUD: 30 cameras (installed Sept. 2021)

Deputy Chief Kitchens has reported:

- They average 2-4 arrests per day involving vehicles with temporary tags
- Flock has been great at preventing many Protective Order crimes

Case from 5/10/22:

- Lewisville TX PD entered a stolen Dodge Scat Pack vehicle into the system Tuesday morning. On Tuesday afternoon, Kaufman Cty. Constable got a hit on the stolen vehicle on one of their Windmill Farms MUD cameras.
- They were able to locate and recover the vehicle, completely undamaged, at N. Forney High School. The suspect was picking up his brother in the pickup line.
- In the vehicle they found two stolen firearms, one which was used in a homicide in Lancaster. This was also a felony as it was on school property- a gun-free zone.
- Police had previously tried to capture the suspect, but weren't able to because he fled.

The below are from 6/8/22:

Stolen vehicles- wanted from Louisiana, murderers, had to use the restroom, stopped at a daycare. 1 AM, got entry camera at Windmill Farms, and also zone camera on Concord. Stopped at neighborhood in Windmill Farms daycare. Vehicle/ suspect apprehended. A success of WM Farms is not only do they have perimeter cameras, but have it zoned, so can pinpoint where the car is. Know it has to be in 4-5 block area.

Multiple stolen cars used in homicides and murders used in Dallas- 4-5 so far, and have recovered the weapons.

Armed robbery out of Rockwell county- went over and robbed a Cici's pizza, our guys got him 45 minutes later. There's usually a delay from the time uploaded in NCIC to TCIC. This Cici's Pizza theft happened at 11 PM, we uploaded the LP to Custom Hot List, and our guys got it at 12:15 AM. Rockwall PD was extremely impressed that we got them that fast.

Averaging 4-7 stolen recoveries a week

Biggest thing right now is the stolen plates- they've figured out the cams, putting them on cars

Warrants- DA is happy about utilization with protective orders alerted to off Flock cameras of those in violation with P. orders. Now we can tell when vehicles are stalking.

#### Stolen Vehicle / Pursuit

**TERRELL, TEXAS** – On Tuesday November 5, 2024, Terrell Police Officers received a Flock Camera alert, issued by the Dallas Police Department, for a vehicle reported as stolen and linked to a recent robbery. Terrell Police Officers located the vehicle in the 1300 block of Rosehill Road. Officers attempted to stop the vehicle as it left the area and a pursuit ensued. The pursuit went westbound on Interstate 20 and ended when the vehicle was disabled after colliding with the center cable barrier. Three occupants of the vehicle were injured in the crash and were transported to a medical facility for treatment of injuries. Two occupants in the vehicle were identified as Manuel Dejesus Martinez Jr. and Derric Dione Simmons.

During a subsequent investigation, officers learned that Martinez and Simmons kidnapped the third occupant of the vehicle from another jurisdiction and drove him to Terrell. Martinez and Simmons then forced the victim into a Terrell residence, where they confronted the resident at gunpoint. Martinez and Simmons then bound and blindfolded the resident and ransacked the home. Martinez and Simmons were leaving the home with the kidnapping victim when officers attempted to make the traffic stop that led to the pursuit.

While inventorying the vehicle, officers located approximately 4 pounds of crystal meth and numerous firearms.

Simmons was arrested and charged with Manufacture and Delivery of a Controlled Substance Penalty Group 1 over = 400 grams, 3 counts of Unlawful Possession of Firearm by Felon, Evading Arrest/Detention w/ Vehicle, Aggravated Kidnapping and Burglary Habitation Intend Other Felony.

Martinez was arrested and charged with Manufacture and Delivery of a Controlled Substance Penalty Group 1 over = 400 grams, Aggravated Kidnapping, and Burglary Habitation Intend Other Felony.







## Tyler PD

Submitted by Det. James Holt to Ashley Shambo 6/12/23:

An out of state vehicle was identified in a theft of ink incident. Using Flock it was discovered to have visited Tyler Previously, but primarily stayed in the Dallas area. A hot list entry was created and the vehicle was alerted on when it returned. According to the shift Lt., "At 1420 hrs., dispatch received a Flock hit on a Maroon Toyota Sienna van in reference to a Romanian fraud group being investigated by Det. Dickerson. The Flock hit requested assistance in identifying the occupants of the van. Officers located this vehicle and conducted a traffic stop at Bellwood and the SSW Loop. During the contact, two subjects were found to be in possession of stolen items, to include 345 cans of baby formula most likely purchased fraudulently from Super One Foods and Walmart. The baby formula and other items were tagged into property. Both suspects were arrested and charged with Fraudulent Use or Possession of Identifying Information."

Both subjects are currently detained in Smith County with over \$200,000 in bonds, apiece. They also have Pennsylvania warrants and potential ICE holds. These subjects are believed to be part of a nationwide Fraud ring.

Our cameras are great. Just yesterday, we had a vehicle transport 2 ex-students and 2 students from another of our campuses to 1 of our high schools. There was a big fight/assault. We were able to determine it was a blue Dodge Durango and the time it should have passed our Flock. I was easily able to determine the license plate based on the Flock.

#### **University of Texas at Tyler PD**

Submitted by Chief Mike Medders 4/22/22:

Last week we had a female student report two suspicious encounters with an unknown female at her on-campus apartment complex. On the second encounter, involving a vehicle, the student believed that there was a male subject in the back seat, and she was able to get a license plate. That license plate was registered to a vehicle in Sugarland, Texas, where our victim is from. We entered that LP into Flock.

Yesterday, the vehicle returned to the apartment complex, and we were alerted by the Flock system. We detained the vehicle as it was exiting the apartment complex. The female driver of the vehicle was the same person our victim had encountered last week. A male subject riding in the backseat of the vehicle was identified as our victim's ex-boyfriend. Upon investigation, it was learned that after their breakup he had engaged in stalking-type behavior toward our victim while she resided in the Houston area. We were able to establish probable cause that this individual was stalking our victim, and we placed him under arrest. In the back seat, in a backpack, we discovered duct tape, handcuffs, gloves, a skull cap, and a small knife. It certainly appears that he had intent to cause harm to our victim.

I would hope that every college campus eventually obtains LP recognition cameras. Our campus is safer because of them.

### **Other areas in North TX:**

#### **Arlene TX PD**

Officer Hernandez reported this to Ashley Shambo 1/26/24

Flock cracked a case wide open yesterday that led to the arrest of a burglar who had broken into a local pharmacy the night before. 4 guns, thousands of dollars in cash, a truck, and over 100 pill bottles were seized/recovered! We learned through Flock that the suspect was coming and going from the DFW area and was possibly about to leave back to DFW to sell the guns and stolen prescription medications. We apprehended him just in time! Another win for the good guys/gals!

#### **Addison TX PD (MOU)**

Reported to James Allen 4/30/24

We had a high priority vehicle burglary that occurred in the parking lot of our city's athletic center. We were unable to identify the suspect due to the location's video quality. However we were able to find the suspect vehicle using the Flock LPR camera located at Midway and Spring Valley in Farmers Branch. That plate is linked to several other BMVs in the past month with

several potential suspects identified by other agencies. Investigation still ongoing but this is a huge success for us.

Anna PD put the vehicle they believed him to be on a Custom Hot List. The Flock cameras alerted them, and officers were able to intercept him prior to any harmful events occurring.



The Anna Police Department is also very pleased with apprehending at least one stolen vehicle per month (this is a lot for their city!) using their Falcons. They are also utilizing the addition of many Oklahoma camera networks coming on board, which they've been using to investigate drugs coming into Anna from Oklahoma.

#### **Argyle PD**

On July 18th, Argyle officers received an alert from their Flock Safety LPRs that a vehicle linked to an elderly missing person from Louisiana had been detected in the area. Officers located the vehicle and initiated a traffic stop. According to Police Chief Emmitt Jackson, the gentleman was disoriented and thought he was near his home in Louisiana.

Officers took him to the hospital and contacted his son, and he soon returned home safely.

A North Texas police department successfully recently took down a million-dollar gift card tampering scam.

Police in Burleson, located about 46 miles southwest of Dallas, made the announcement on July 8. Two suspects believed to be part of a gift card tampering ring that spanned several states were successfully taken into custody, per a news release from the Burleson Police Department (BPD).

Officers recovered 4,017 gift cards with an estimated value of \$1,720,050.

The investigation into the scammers had a major breakthrough on June 27, when the Flock Safety Automated License Plate Reader system flagged a suspect vehicle — a Honda Accord — previously linked to fraudulent activity at several Home Depot stores.

A Burleson officer working within the Fort Worth Police Department's Real Time Crime Center alerted patrol officers, who located the Accord in the parking lot of a Target store at 200 NW John Jones Dr.

The officers saw two males exit the store, climb into the Accord, and drive out of the parking lot. According to the press release, the driver committed a traffic violation, and the officers made a traffic stop.

When officers approached the vehicle, they noticed a "large number of gift cards in plain view," giving them probable cause for a search, per BPD. As a result, "over 1,000 gift cards neatly packaged and organized in bundles and boxes" were uncovered.

The suspects were arrested, and the investigation turned to a hotel in Carrollton where they were reportedly staying.

Officers with BPD's Criminal Investigations Division obtained a search warrant before Burleson's Strategic Response Team visited the hotel. Thousands more gift cards were found.

The two suspects, who were not named, have been charged with three first-degree felonies: theft of property over \$300,000; fraud, possession, or use of credit or debit card for the obtention of 50 or more items; and fraudulent use or possession of identifying information of 50 or more items.

While investigating the case, BDP worked alongside the Carrollton, Colleyville, and Euless Police Departments, the U.S. Secret Service Task Force, U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, Homeland Security Investigations, Texas Financial Crimes Intelligence Center, and both Home Depot and Target's corporate organized retail crime teams. The press release credits the collaborative effort for the outcome.

North Texas has seen its fair share of tampered gift card schemes, with this strategy garnering particular attention during the holiday season.

In Dallas, according to the City's crime analytics dashboard, as of July 7, 1,210 fraud offenses had been reported. While this crime category is trending downward, larceny-theft and shoplifting rates are growing, clocking a 5.9% and 16.5% increase year over year, respectively.

The Dallas Police Department has been directing its stretched resources toward reducing violent crime. Relatedly, property crime has taken off as of late.

DPD fields only around 3,000 officers, far short of the 4,000 officers previously recommended by a City analysis. With a budget of just \$654 million this fiscal year, it is unclear if the department can close the gap. This sum also falls considerably short of the amount of taxpayer money other high-crime cities, such as Chicago and New York City, direct to their police departments.

#### **Carrollton PD**

**8/29/2022**

Officers responded to a Flock alert of a stolen vehicle. Officers Torres and A. Williams located the vehicle in front of Dollar General. Officers contacted two suspects returning to the vehicle from the store. The suspects had just stolen merchandise, but the store did not make a criminal complaint. One suspect was arrested for Possession of Drug Paraphernalia and the other was arrested for Public Intoxication. The vehicle was confirmed stolen out of Dallas and impounded.

Reported by Sgt. Blackwell to Ashley Shambo 7/3/23:

...We were only able to add an event statistic to our RMS system in the middle of 2021 to attempt tracking Flock related calls that were either generated from a FLOCK alert or FLOCK helped resolve.

Which for 2022 show 39 offenses and 18 arrests with 23 charges. Some of these include Evading Arrest, Possession of Controlled Substance, DWI , and UUMV

YTD for 2023 it is 27 offenses and 12 arrests with 19 charges. Some of these include Aggravated Assault WDW, Assault CBI FV, Evading and UUMV.

I will say these numbers are the bare minimum and are probably higher (especially for investigative leads generated) as the event statistics check box is not a mandatory field so officers can miss it or forget to check it. To check it as an investigative lead after the fact a supervisor has to go in the case and check it which I seriously doubt is happening every time it should.

Cleburne, TX – On Thursday, December 19, 2024, at 8:42 pm, Cleburne Police and Cleburne Fire responded to the 300 block of Huron Street regarding a stabbing. A female called 9-1-1 and reported her 23-year-old grandson had killed her 69-year-old husband. The suspect fled the residence prior to the officer's arrival.

The suspect was identified as Antron Rayquon Bell, a 23-year-old Cleburne resident. With the help of the Flock Safety camera system, Officers were able to locate the vehicle the suspect was driving and subsequently took him into custody.

Bell has been arrested and charged with the murder. He is awaiting arraignment.

There are no other suspects in relation to this case.

Investigation continues.

## **Ector County Environmental Enforcement**

**"Sees success stopping illegal dumping with high-tech public safety system"**

Jul. 14—The Ector County Environmental Enforcement unit has seen positive results after deploying Flock Safety technology to locate and apprehend illegal dumpers, a press release detailed.

Flock Safety provides a public safety operating system that helps communities, businesses, and law enforcement work together to fight crime.

Last summer, Ector County Commissioner Mike Gardner reported that about \$200,000 worth of trash had been illegally disposed of so far that year. The trash included items such as couches, tires, and old appliances, which Ector County was then forced to clean up.

The Flock Safety system helps law enforcement such as Ector County investigate crime by providing objective evidence — license plates and vehicle characteristics. Most illegal dumping is committed with the aid of a vehicle, making the license plate a critical piece of evidence in locating suspects committing this type of crime.

The system also sends real-time alerts to law enforcement when a stolen car, known wanted suspect from a state or national crime database, or missing/endangered person (such as an AMBER or Silver Alert) enters the jurisdiction.

Ector County owns all of the data generated by the Flock Safety technology, and it is never sold or shared with third parties. The cameras cannot capture speed, record faces, and are not intended for minor traffic or parking violations.

"While some may think it a minor crime, illegal dumping harms our environment, creates infrastructure issues, and costs Ector County taxpayers hundreds of thousands of dollars each year," Ector County Environmental Enforcement Director Rickey George stated in the press release. "The County is committed to deploying the latest technology to ensure illegal dumping does not adversely harm the lives of Ector County citizens."

The Flock Safety system is in use in over 2,000 cities across the country, and the company works with thousands of law enforcement agencies. Law enforcement have reported crime reductions of up to 70% when deploying Flock Safety in their communities.

Arrest made of thief who stole over \$5 million in vehicles. DFW Airport PD were able to track the suspect's cell phone, identify the times that he was at the airport, and used Flock to get photo evidence of it. The FBI wanted to persecute for this which is rare for auto theft.

The news report:

A car theft ring with international ties has stolen nearly \$5 million worth of vehicles from Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport, according to a new search warrant obtained by NBC 5. DFW Airport Police said the arrest of the group's leader last month helped officials unravel the multi-state conspiracy.

Last fall, NBC 5 reported on a rise in car thefts from DFW Airport. At the time, officials told us, "Investigators do believe there is an element of crime rings behind many of the thefts." On Wednesday, NBC 5 received confirmation: A search warrant filed in Tarrant County showed that the DFW Airport Police had identified a nationwide crime group stealing vehicles from the airport.

The document said police have been investigating the ring based in Houston since last February.

"Approximately 14 suspects have been identified...the suspects in this group have stolen approximately 52 cars from DFW, for a total loss of \$4.9 million," an investigator said in the document.

"When I checked under my TollTag account, I saw that on Saturday night, it was on a tollway in Houston on a Harris County toll road," Chaz Mady told NBC 5 in November 2023. The document said the group had been stealing cars from the airport from early 2023 to last month.

In the search warrant, investigators said they've arrested three suspects, including the leader of the ring, writing, "Yoel Hernandez-Frometa uses Autel devices to reprogram key fobs so he can steal vehicles."

Police said the ring targeted other airports in Texas, New Mexico, Utah and Nevada.

"What we have seen is that the crime is getting more and more sophisticated as technology progresses," Tarleton State criminologist Alex Del Carmen told NBC 5 in September. According to court documents, the thieves would change Vehicle Identification Numbers, illegally retitle the cars, and then sell them, and often take them across the border to Mexico. Criminal experts have told NBC 5 that as the Metroplex grows, nationwide criminal rings will likely target the DFW area.

"We've seen an increase of what appears to be more sophisticated crime, more crime that has ties internationally and throughout the United States," said Del Carmen.

In situations where you must leave your car parked somewhere long term, experts said drivers could use tools like a wheel lock as an extra security measure to prevent theft.

In a new statement today, leaders of DFW airport said, "Investigators with the DFW Airport Department of Public Safety remain in close contact with local, state and federal law enforcement agencies to identify and disrupt organized crime rings targeting airport parking facilities throughout the country. Due to the work of DFW Airport Police, the airport has seen a more than 40% reduction in car thefts from the terminal areas so far this year compared with 2023."



**Elm Ridge PD (Formerly Denton County Water District PD)**

The family was extremely concerned as it was outside of her normal pattern and she did not have her cell phone. The RTCC put her plate into a custom hotlist, it hit rather quickly and officers were dispatched. They located her and got her home safely. She said she had forgotten how to get home and didn't know where to go or what to do so she was just driving around. Her family was incredibly thankful that the PD were able to locate her so quickly and before anything potential harmful may have happened. Feels good to share a story like this one!

**Fort Worth PD**

This morning we received the city wide broadcast below concerning a suspect vehicle in a shooting that occurred in the nearby city of Alvarado.

"ATTN: NW C12....BOLO FOR SIG 37 ACTOR FROM ALVARADO PD.....BLK OR DARK BLU RANGE ROVER UNK LP WITH SKULL DECAL IN BACK WINDOW...SUSPECT VEHICLE IN SIG 37 IN THEIR AREA...IF LOCATED PLEASE FORWARD LP OR VIN TO ALVARADO PD...//CP OFFICER GUY 214-536-6206"

I was able to use the window sticker filter and was able to locate the actual suspect vehicle in less than 15 minutes. Ironically, my coworker Officer Rudd was on the phone with Alvarado PD attempting to get additional information when I found the image. The vehicle does have history with the known suspect.

The filter was very impressive and helpful.

**Fort Worth PD**

The Fort Worth PD RTCC continues to see tremendous success utilizing Flock as a key layer of technology in solving serious crimes. On Friday, they were able to locate and assist in the arrest of a kidnapping suspect and safely recover the victim. Although the press release says a statewide Texas Clear Alert (adult rescue) was initiated, the RTCC created a custom hotlist entry and was able to determine the location of the vehicle and assist in tracking during the chase.

Last Thursday while onsite, we were able to watch the team direct field officers in locating and arresting a burglary suspect based on a custom hotlist from a case file. Our #SOLVED awards winner, Officer Daisy Lofland, played a key role in this one as well as the identification and arrest of a

highway shooter earlier in the week. Based on eye witness accounts, but no plate number, a vehicle matching the description of the suspect vehicle was located on Flock cameras before the shooting (with the window up) and just after the shooting (with the window down). After conducting additional research, it was confirmed this was indeed the vehicle in question and the suspect was located and taken into custody.

#### **Garland TX PD**

Chief Bryan shared with Jasmine Norton:

Although we are not releasing details publicly, please pass along that the Flock system was instrumental in solving this homicide. The vehicle was identified and seized within hours of this offense.

#### **Grapevine TX PD**

Grapevine TX PD arrested and charged seven young men in an organized vehicle theft ring.

By March of this year, investigators had uncovered a violent conspiracy to steal and sell vehicles all over the metroplex. Multiple North Texas agencies were involved in this case.

The group targeted luxury vehicles. Investigators learned the suspects were reselling the stolen vehicles to people in the area, other states and across the border in Mexico. Grapevine police began their investigation in 2023 when its city was plagued by a group stealing vehicles from public parking lots, specifically Grapevine Mills Mall.

Grapevine police arrested seven people.

The department says they were part of a prolific auto theft ring and are now charged with engaging in organized crime.

Grapevine investigators linked this group to more than 200 auto thefts across North Texas, including Irving, Addison, Grand Prairie, Euless and Dallas.

Police say the group became more violent as time went on, including evading arrest, armed robberies and ramming police vehicles.

According to court documents, detectives used surveillance video, cell phone records, and Flock cameras to trace the group back to two homes in Dallas County.

Police say one of the suspects posted photos of the luxury vehicles on his social media just days before his Garland home was raided by SWAT in March.

According to court documents, the suspects would reprogram key fobs for the stolen vehicles.

"It's over \$9 million in stolen lost property," McNew said. "The more we can do to stop things like this and the bad out of our community, the better."

When some of the suspects were arrested for this case, they had active armed robbery and evading arrest warrants out of other cities.

Surveillance video captured the murder of 27-year-old Jonathan Berto.

It was his mother who ultimately found his body after he didn't show up to pick up his girlfriend and baby. Lewisville police say nearby surveillance video captured the shooting on camera and also the suspect's license plate. Investigators traced the plate to a Mesquite address and used Flock cameras to take the suspect into custody.

It was a mother's instinct Sunday evening when Rosa Berto-Chapa received a phone call that her son, Berto, was late picking up his girlfriend and their newborn. She tracked her son's last location at a parking lot of a Lewisville auto shop off I-35 E.

"And I saw his body laying on the ground, covered in a plastic white bag," she said. Lewisville police say Berto was found shot to death next to his silver truck just after 5 p.m. Sunday.

According to an arrest warrant affidavit FOX 4 obtained Thursday, investigators believe Berto's murder took place shortly after a minor car collision.

Police viewed surveillance video from the auto shop showing a black Tahoe pull up next to Berto's truck. Police say suspect Arrior Morris, 39, got out of the Tahoe "holding a semi-automatic firearm in his right hand."

Police say Morris "looked down at the front bumper of his Tahoe, shakes his head from side to side once" and then is seen "pointing the gun at Jonathan's head."

According to investigators, Morris fired four times and then took off. "There was no reason for my son's life to be taken that way. There is no reason," Berto-Chapa said. A photo shows a bullet hole through Berto's passenger window plus black paint scraped across the back left side of his truck.

Investigators say they got a license plate number for the Tahoe from the surveillance video and traced it back to an address in Mesquite. Tuesday, Mesquite police pulled Morris over and took him into custody. He's now charged with murder.



"He can remember my son's face for the rest of his life and know what he did to this little girl that lost her dad," Berto-Chapa said. "She won't be able to ever dance with her dad. She won't ever be able to hug him anymore. I want him to know what he did." He was also arrested for manslaughter in 2002 in Mississippi.

In a display of exemplary police work, the Mansfield Police Night Shift successfully apprehended several suspects involved in a stolen vehicle incident on N. Walnut Creek.

**Two Odessa men have been arrested in connection with a series of burglaries dating as far back as November.**

According to an Odessa Police Department report, on Feb. 9 a FLOCK camera spotted a license plate on a stolen Hyundai Sonata that had been used in multiple burglaries and tracked the car to a gas station in the 100 block of Yukon.

Inside the car, officers found a lot of stolen property and Roger Quincy Risher, who matched a suspect in an auto burglary case, the report stated.

Officer obtained a search warrant for a home in the 8300 block of Golder Avenue where another stolen vehicle was found along with several other stolen items, including keys to a separate stolen vehicle, the report stated.

A man at the residence, Abel Abila, admitted he'd committed several burglaries with Risher, according to the report.

Warrants were obtained for the arrests of Abila and Risher in connection with a Ford Explorer stolen in November, auto burglaries on Jan. 12 and Jan. 13, and multiple auto burglaries on Feb. 2 and Feb. 7. In addition, Risher was arrested for allegedly stealing a GMC Sierra Denali on Feb. 7.

According to the report, the men were in possession of identifying information belonging to 14 people and on at least two occasions, credit cards belonging to two people were used without their consent.

Risher was booked into the Ector County jail on suspicion of nine counts of burglary of a vehicle, two counts of burglary of a building and one count each of unauthorized use of a vehicle, engaging in organized criminal activity, attempted burglary of a building, theft of property \$2,500-\$30,000, theft of property and fraudulent use of identifying information.

He remains in custody on surety bonds totaling \$152,500.

Abila was arrested on suspicion of two counts of burglary of a building and one count each of engaging in organized criminal activity and attempted burglary of a building. He was also taken into custody on three failure to appear warrants, giving false information and a U.S. Marshal's hold. He is no longer in the Ector County jail.

#### **Plano PD**

Plano TX PD arrested 8 suspects who they believe may be connected to more than 50 ATM thefts across DFW.

Police arrested the suspects on June 1 while they were in the process of burglarizing an ATM at a 7-Eleven in Denton, TX. Plano believes the same suspects were responsible for an ATM burglary at a Plano 7-Eleven on May 25. Five suspects had backed a pickup truck into the front of the store, smashing a window. The suspects wrapped a chain around the ATM and using the truck yanked it out of the store.

Detectives from Plano, Coppell, Dallas, Euless, Frisco, Garland, Grapevine, Texas DPS and a 7-Eleven Zone Asset Protection Manager took part in the investigation.

Lt. Jares at Plano PD said Flock Hot List hits were used to locate two of the suspect vehicles prior to the arrest. One belonged to a lookout, and the other was a rented vehicle.

Saturday morning PPD responded to a shooting incident. Through the course of the investigation, we were able to identify a vehicle that belonged to the suspect who fled prior to officer arrival. We were not able to locate the suspect using an exigent phone ping as it was believed the victim (who also left the scene and was non-cooperative) had the suspects cell phone. We entered her vehicle into the custom hotlist in hopes to locate her if she returned. A little over 24hrs later, she returned to the residence. While searching the teen's home in the 6400 block of Magnolia Lane, the Rowlett SWAT Team and CID recovered four stolen firearms and seized several computers that are believed to be stolen.

On east side of town, guy came up from Limestone, had estranged girlfriend up here, an elderly guy. Flock picked him up going northbound, then he murdered ex girlfriend, then picked up going southbound. Solved within 30 hours.

Sex trafficking of a juvenile. From NCIC warrant that led them to that suspect. Was a 15 year old victim.

Lt. Ferrie reported to Ashley Shambo on 4/30/24

We have a Flock success story we'd like to share with Flock.

At approximately 6:09pm on Friday, April 19, 2024, Rowlett PD officers received notifications from their FLOCK app that a gray Toyota SUV entered into the city of Rowlett (Via N/B Dalrock from I30) with NCIC warrants attached to it. Rowlett officers researched the vehicle tag and ascertained that two persons associated with this vehicle were wanted out of Euless TX for aggravated robbery amongst other TCIC/NCIC warrants out of Dallas County. Officers coordinated their response and located the vehicle a short time later at the gas pumps at 1700 Dalrock Rd where they, along with two Rockwall County Deputies, located an individual matching one of the wanted suspects walking towards the vehicle with another subject inside the vehicle and detained both subjects. Officers identified the subjects as the two wanted persons and they were placed in custody for their multiple outstanding warrants. Rowlett PD notified Euless detectives of the arrest and were advised Dallas PD also was looking into the pair for multiple other robberies in the area.

This was a well coordinated effort amongst officers and dispatchers that led to the successful apprehension of two dangerous fugitives, and in doing so providing excellent service to our citizens by making Rowlett a safer place.

**Saginaw PD**

Asst. Chief Badovinac shared with Ashley Shambo 10/24/24

We have used flock on numerous occasions to make felony arrests and recover stolen vehicles but the two cases below were violent crime that occurred in our city, where Flock was instrumental in solving both cases.

6/11/2024 – Aggravated Assault w/Deadly Weapon. The victim was a juvenile and had a handgun pointed at them from an operator of a vehicle in the area of camera # 14 as the juvenile was walking down the sidewalk. A brief vehicle description was the only lead in the case with no license plate information. Investigators located a similar vehicle using Flock in the area on a routine basis at around the same time the offense occurred. Using the information from the license plate and other investigative resources they were able to issue an arrest warrant on the suspect.

7/10/2024 – Aggravated Assault w/Deadly Weapon. The victim was operating a vehicle in the area of camera # 4 transporting multiple passengers. Occupants of another vehicle in the same area shot into the victim's vehicle striking the driver in the neck. With the assistance of camera # 4 along with camera # 19 multiple leads were generated and using additional investigative resources three arrest warrants were issued for three suspects in this case. The victim suffered critical injuries and the charge could be upgraded to Murder on the three suspects in the future.

AC Tillerson reported to Aaron Nichol 2/10/23:

Cameras were set up last Monday just after lunch. Wednesday morning on my way in I saw a pedestrian light pole that had been struck by a vehicle. As we investigated our campus security camera caught an image of the vehicle striking the pole from literally directly above. Not even being trained on the system and just given access the day before, I managed to search times on the Flock camera adjacent to the scene. Bingo – license plate for suspect vehicle in less than 48 hours and not training.

Flock already paid for itself. An officer dropped his access card in the parking lot. They looked at the parking video and saw the vehicle description. They were able to identify the vehicle in Flock and get the plate. Two detectives showed up to the guy's house. The guy said he had planned to give it back and pulled the card out of his pocket. To recreate new cards for all of campus would have cost them \$1.5M dollars.

**University of Texas at Dallas PD**

Lt. Zuber reported to Ashley Shambo 10/17/23:

The University of Texas at Dallas recently had a student call the suicide hotline and said he was having thoughts of suicide. He said he was planning to jump off the top of a parking garage very soon, but didn't say which one. The person who received the phone call reported this information to UT Dallas PD, the police then confirmed the caller was a registered student, looked his vehicle up since he had registered for parking on campus, and entered the license plate into Flock Safety. They got a hit on the vehicle, which

determined which parking garage the student had driven to, located the student who was heading to the top of the parking garage, spoke with him, and took him to the hospital, preventing a suicide attempt. The primary two officers that engaged with him are receiving Life Saving Awards from the University of Texas System.

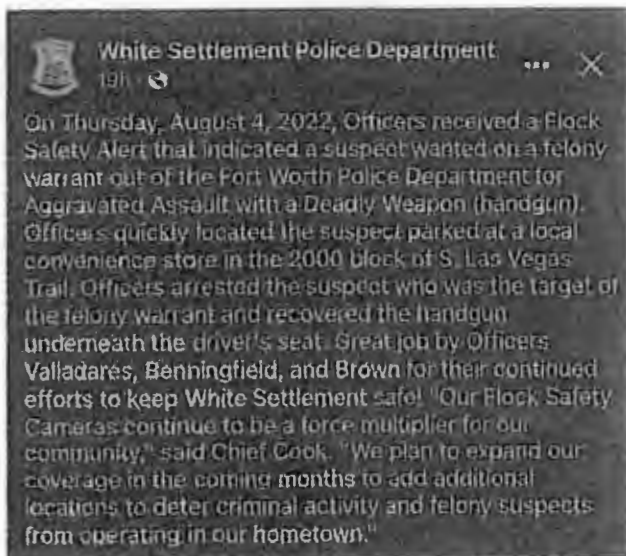

#### Vehicle Pursuit Crash – Stolen Car & Violent Felon Apprehended with Video Release



On Wednesday, November 23, 2022 at 2:22 p.m., the White Settlement Police Department received a license plate reader alert from a Flock Safety System that a stolen car and possible armed robbery suspect had entered the city at Clifford Street and Loop 820. Officers quickly located the suspect vehicle turning southbound on N. Las Vegas Trail from Clifford Street. As officers attempted to stop the stolen vehicle, the suspect

fled at a high rate of speed and lost control on S. Las Vegas Trail near Gibbs. The stolen car left the roadway and crashed into a chain-link fence at Central Park. The driver attempted to flee on foot, however he was caught after a foot pursuit. No other motorists or property damage occurred.

The suspect, identified as 39-year old Michael Grant, faces several charges and is under investigation for multiple armed robberies that have occurred in White Settlement and Benbrook. A fake firearm was located inside the car along with clothing that may be associated with recent robberies. The vehicle was also stolen from White Settlement a few days prior in the 7600 block of West Freeway.

"This suspect was out on parole and should have remained in prison for similar charges that he is being investigated for today," said Chief of Police Christopher Cook. "We have to continue to advocate for stiffer penalties for committing violent offenses and then fleeing in a vehicle. This violent felon put several community members and police officers at risk today by fleeing at such high speeds and driving in a reckless manner. As a Chief, I saw this dangerous behavior firsthand by joining the pursuit and seeing the crash. We are extremely thankful no innocent community members or officers were hurt by these outrageous decisions made by the suspect."

After the TFO and detectives worked the case, they added the alert so that an arrest could be made on the suspect. Sgt. Blaustein's shift were able to knock the car down based upon a Flock hit and I believe this case is being prosecuted under the federal system." Uncovered 600-700 fentanyl pills.

#### SPOTLIGHT Flock Safety Cameras



The department leases 10 Flock Safety cameras throughout the city and has access to a vast network of other Flock cameras from partner agencies that border the City of White Settlement.

The Flock Safety camera is a license plate reader placed on public roadways to alert officers to stolen vehicles, fugitives, missing persons, and other alerts related to burglary suspects or other violent individuals.

The data is not stored, unless a detective downloads the information for a criminal investigation. After thirty days, all license plate reader data is purged from the Flock Safety system.

8/27/24 Travis County + Klamath Falls PD, OR: On August 27th, Klamath Falls Police officers received an alert from their Flock Safety LPRs that a vehicle reported stolen out of Texas had been detected in the area. Officers located the vehicle and initiated a traffic stop, detaining two occupants.

After further investigation officers established that the vehicle was associated with Ms. Brenna Swindell, who'd been reported missing and endangered and may be traveling with an estranged boyfriend with an active warrant for his arrest.

Officers confirmed that the missing woman and wanted man were the two occupants of the vehicle, and arrested the male suspect.

**Connor Metz shared:**

4/13/24 Harris County Constables: On April 13th, Harris County constables received an alert that a vehicle linked to an elderly person reported missing in Fort Bend County was nearby.

Deputies located the vehicle, initiated a traffic stop, and brought the senior to a local hospital where his spouse was notified of his location.

1/13/23

**Baytown PD**

A deceased male was found in Houston, TX with multiple gun shot wounds. Video from the area was gathered by Houston PD which showed a truck arrive at the location where the victim was waiting. The victim got in the passenger seat and about 10 flashes of light are observed (believed to be muzzle flashes). The victim is then pushed from the passenger seat and the truck leaves. Houston PD was able to obtain a license plate and it was registered in Baytown, Tx. They contacted me with the info but we were unable to find the truck at the registered address or any other associated addresses. I ran the LP in flock and saw that it was hitting an HOA owned reader in our jurisdiction almost daily. We checked that neighborhood and located the truck a short time later and set up surveillance. We were able to conduct a traffic stop on the driver (murder suspect) leading to an arrest unrelated to the murder. Upon a vehicle search small amounts of dry blood were found on the passenger door and headliner area. It was evident that the truck had been detailed prior to this, but they missed some spots. The suspect did not confess but other investigative techniques put him at the murder scene.






